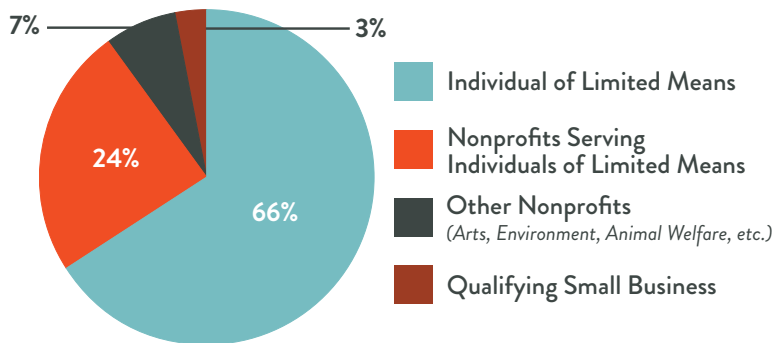

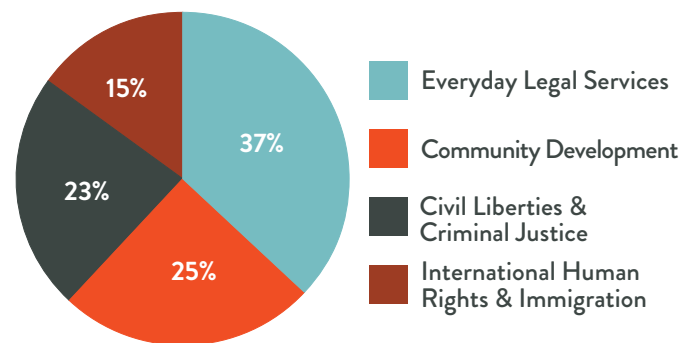

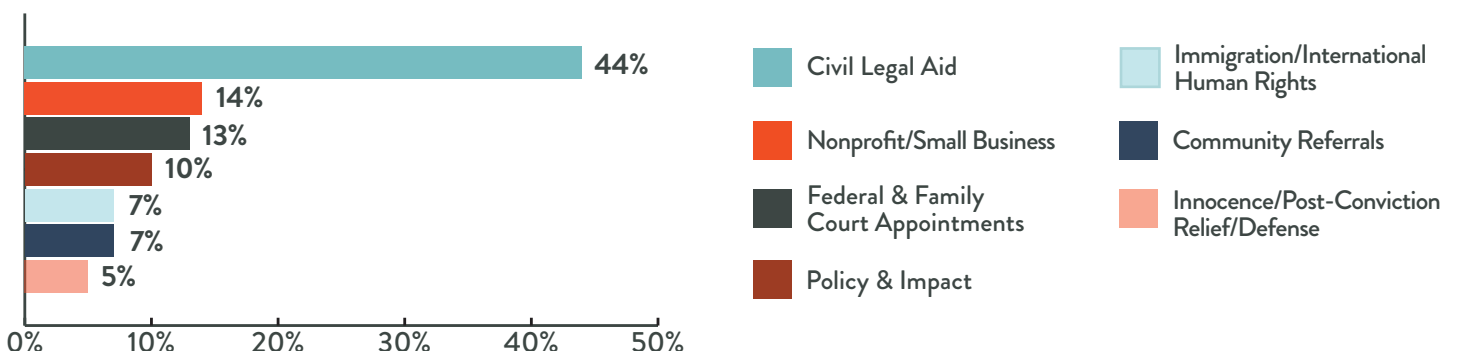
PRO BONO BY CLIENT TYPE

FOCUS OF REFERRING LEGAL SERVICE ORGANIZATION



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Everyday Legal Services

In 2025, 37% of Stinson's pro bono representation involved "everyday" legal matters that shape family stability, housing security, health care planning and economic opportunity. Across offices, timekeepers handled matters involving advance care planning, guardianship, children's representation, housing and consumer issues for low-income clients and community members.

DEINARD LEGAL CLINIC

The Deinard Legal Clinic (DLC) is Stinson's 32-year-old medical-legal partnership that provides free legal representation to the patients of the Community-University Health Care Center (CUHCC) in the Phillips neighborhood in Minneapolis. The DLC provides direct representation to low-income individuals on a range of legal issues that can be social determinants of health. In 2025, the DLC continued to serve as the largest source of pro bono matters for the Minneapolis office, accounting for 62% of total pro bono time, and it remains one of the firm's most impactful community partnerships. Total time donated to DLC matters has nearly doubled over the last two years, rising to 5,276 hours in 2025.

The clinic received 160 referrals from CUHCC staff and providers in 2025, and a total of 123 billers were involved in DLC work this year, including 80 Minneapolis timekeepers and 43 timekeepers from other offices across the firm.

The clinic continues to serve a client population with significant and complex needs. In 2025, 77% of referrals involved immigration matters, 79% of referrals came from social workers or mental health staff, 68% of clients identified as female, 85% of clients identified as Black, Indigenous or People of Color and 31% of clients were unemployed.

Deinard Legal Clinic Award

The firm's 2025 Deinard Legal Clinic Award was given to Minneapolis Partner Bill Gotlieb for donating hundreds of hours to DLC family law divorce and child custody matters. His recent efforts helped secure a settlement for a client who had been trapped in an abusive marriage for over 20 years.

ADVANCE CARE PLANNING

In 2025, Stinson's Pro Bono Week celebration focused on the legal needs of older adults and seniors, highlighting the many ways attorneys and paralegals across the firm help clients plan for the future with dignity and security. Throughout the fall, 54 timekeepers in 12 offices participated in advance care planning clinics with Bet Tzedek Legal Services in California, the Dallas Volunteer Attorney Program, the Denver Bar Association's Metro Volunteer Lawyers, Mid-Missouri Legal Services, Legal Aid of Western Missouri's Adopt-a-Neighborhood Project, the Deinard Legal Clinic in Minneapolis, the New York Legal Assistance Group, Legal Aid of Nebraska, the Missouri Veterans Commission and Bar Association of Metropolitan St. Louis, and the Wichita Bar Association. Together, these clinics expanded access to wills, powers of attorney, beneficiary deeds and related planning documents for low-income seniors, veterans and community members.

“Over the course of my career at Stinson, I have been able to provide estate planning services to dozens of individuals through Legal Services of Eastern Missouri's Volunteer Lawyers Program. Pro bono estate planning work allows me to help individuals have a voice in their future care and memorialize their wishes when they are no longer able to communicate for themselves. Through this work, it is my hope that I can help bring these clients some peace of mind about their futures.”

Pro Bono Week programming included two trainings:

An update on laws and policies affecting low-income older adults and seniors, provided by Amber Christ, former Managing Director of Health Advocacy at Justice in Aging, a national organization that uses the power of law to fight senior poverty by securing access to affordable health care, economic security and the courts for older adults with limited resources.

A discussion of cultural humility in the delivery of advance care planning legal services, presented by Dr. Nathan Mesfin, a clinical practitioner and researcher with the University of Minnesota Medical School, who specializes in end-of-life care and health disparities, and Stinson Tax, Trusts & Estates attorney Amy Johns, who provided a framework for helping diverse pro bono clients achieve their advance care planning goals.

CHILDREN'S REPRESENTATION

In 2025, Stinson continued to support children and families through guardian ad litem (GAL) work, Special Immigrant Juvenile Status matters and longstanding partnerships with child advocacy organizations. Following the closure of the Office of the Guardian ad Litem, Pro Bono Attorney Judith Westmoreland began accepting GAL matters from the court in cases where the Jackson County CASA program had a conflict. In October, Judith hosted a GAL training session with Jackson County CASA for Stinson attorneys and staff interested in assisting with these cases.

CONSUMER ASSISTANCE

In 2025, Stinson dedicated nearly 650 hours to consumer matters for low-income individuals referred by legal services organizations across multiple offices, including the Deinard Legal Clinic and Volunteer Lawyers Network in Minneapolis; Community Legal Services in Phoenix; LAWMO and Volunteer Lawyers and Accountants for the Arts in Kansas City; Legal Services of Eastern Missouri in St. Louis; Tzedek DC in Washington, DC; Bay Area Legal Services in Tampa; and Volunteer Legal Services of Central Texas in Austin.

GUARDIANSHIP

In 2025, more than 800 hours were dedicated to family law and guardianship matters referred by the Deinard Legal Clinic and the Volunteer Lawyers Network in Minneapolis, Jackson County CASA, Kansas Legal Services and Legal Aid of Western Missouri in Kansas City, and Saint Francis Community Services and EmberHope in Wichita. At Legal Aid of Western Missouri's Volunteer Attorney Project "Party with a Purpose" in November, Kansas City litigation Partner Sean Colligan was honored with the Welch Award for Excellence in Volunteer Services. A recent matter handled by Sean and Kansas City attorney Austin Tapuro involved helping a grandmother secure guardianship of two minors after the sudden deaths of both parents, providing critical stability during a period of profound loss. In addition to his work with the Volunteer Attorney Project, Sean is also a regular volunteer with the Kansas City Metropolitan Bar Foundation Military Matters program.

HOUSING

In 2025, Stinson dedicated nearly 1,100 hours to housing matters.

In Minneapolis, 32 timekeepers volunteered on DLC housing matters and on the Volunteer Lawyers Network Eviction Representation Project and monthly housing advice clinic. Minneapolis Partner Kevin Kitchen and attorney Zachary Wright represented a single mother of two young children in a rent escrow action after her landlord failed to address serious repair issues, including the lack of adequate hot water. After the case was set for trial, the team obtained a settlement requiring repairs, rent abatement, statutory penalties and other relief equal to one full year of rent. Later in the year, Minneapolis Partner Keith Moheban secured a strong result for a tenant facing serious repair issues and a retaliatory eviction, obtaining a dismissal of the eviction claim and a settlement allowing the client to terminate her lease early, receive three months of full rent abatement, and obtain a neutral landlord reference.

The Phoenix office launched a new monthly tenant advice clinic with Community Legal Services of Arizona, accounting for more than 100 hours in 2025. Through the clinic, attorneys advised clients on a range of landlord-tenant matters, from vehicle towing disputes to recovery of security deposits.

In Tampa, 10 timekeepers logged over 200 hours on two landlord-tenant matters, under the leadership of Partners Brian Cummings and Murray Silverstein.

In 2025, 25% of Stinson's pro bono work involved issues of community development, including support for partner neighborhoods, nonprofits and low-income entrepreneurs and their small businesses. Stinson's transactional pro bono work seeks to deliver free, high-quality legal representation so nonprofits can focus on providing critical social services and important cultural programming to our communities.

KANSAS CITY 6TH ANNUAL NONPROFIT LEGAL CLINIC

In June, the Kansas City office hosted its sixth annual Nonprofit Legal Clinic, designed to provide local nonprofits with pro bono support on legal issues facing their organizations, including corporate governance, employment, real estate and intellectual property matters. The clinic was organized by Stinson and the University of Missouri–Kansas City School of Law Entrepreneurial Legal Services Clinic, in coordination with Kansas Legal Services and the Mid-America Chapter of the Association of Corporate Counsel, with fiscal sponsorship from Stinson, Koch Capabilities, LLC and Terracon Consultants, Inc. At the clinic, 12 teams of Stinson attorneys, including 12 Stinson summer associates, and in-house counsel and interns from Koch, Terracon, PNC Bank, Hallmark and other local corporations provided legal services to 12 local nonprofits that provide programming for children and youth, arts and education, housing and homelessness, animal welfare, and support for veterans.

2025 PRO BONO IMPACT AWARD

The recipient of the firm's 2026 Pro Bono Impact Award was Kansas City attorney Kristen Ellis Johnson in recognition of her multi-year representation of two local small businesses, including an urban farm that sustainably produces organic food, and a compost business that turns 20,000 pounds of food waste from across the metropolitan area into natural fertilizer for use by the farm and local residents.

HOUSING ORGANIZATIONS

A Kansas City team led by Partner Rob Hunter provided substantial operational and strategic support to The Way Home, an affordable housing accelerator working to expand access to housing across the full continuum — from emergency shelter and transitional housing to affordable rentals and wealth-building homeownership. The Way Home brings together developers, lenders, funders, and policymakers to treat affordable housing as a market-level opportunity rather than a charity. The matter involved a broad range of organizational needs, including developing new finance, governance, insurance, and liability structures.

A separate multi-office team led by Kansas City Partner Eric Mikkelsen represented a local housing organization in the acquisition of another nonprofit. Through new and renovated housing, homeownership promotion and preservation, and community engagement, the group takes a holistic approach to neighborhood development.

COLORADO LAWYERS COMMITTEE

Attorneys in the Denver office worked on transactional matters referred by the Colorado Lawyers Committee, including Office Managing Partner Deborah Bayles's representation of a local food pantry and Partner Mark Bell's work assisting a theater company through a merger.

MINNESOTA TRANSACTIONAL PRO BONO

Minneapolis timekeepers donated nearly 150 hours to matters referred by the University of Minnesota Business Law and Entrepreneurship Clinic and more than 100 hours to five nonprofits and small businesses referred by LegalCORPS. This year's Community Development Award was presented to Minneapolis Partner Dave Ezrilov, whose transactional pro bono work has supported small businesses, nonprofits and entrepreneurs across the Twin Cities. His mentorship and willingness to serve as a supervising attorney have also helped expand opportunities for additional attorneys to engage in this important work.

NEIGHBORHOOD PARTNERSHIPS

Stinson's representation of historic neighborhoods helps reduce crime through the revitalization of housing stock, encourages economic growth and investment and enables neighborhoods to advance their collective goals.

Marlborough

In 2025, Stinson completed its 16th year in partnership with the Marlborough neighborhood in Kansas City and Legal Aid of Western Missouri's Adopt-a-Neighborhood Project. The partnership was formed in 2009 when Stinson helped five historic neighborhoods gain nonprofit status to create the Marlborough Community Coalition. In 2025, Stinson donated more than 500 pro bono hours to 13 Marlborough matters and clinics.

In July, Kansas City summer associates learned about the Marlborough neighborhood from Legal Aid of Western Missouri's Adopt-a-Neighborhood Project, the Marlborough Community Coalition and Stinson Partner Jere Sellers. Summer associates were trained on Missouri's Abandoned Housing Act and nuisance statutes and helped prepare demand letters and petitions in new Marlborough nuisance matters aimed at remediating blight and vacancy. During October Pro Bono Week, attorneys and paralegals participated in a beneficiary deed clinic in support of Marlborough residents.

Hyde Park

In St. Louis, Stinson donated more than 200 pro bono hours to five Hyde Park matters and clinics in 2025. St. Louis Partner Vince Keady, working with Legal Services of Eastern Missouri's Neighborhood Vacancy Initiative and Great Rivers Environmental Law Center, continued his representation of the Hyde Park Neighborhood Association and neighboring property owners in litigation regarding 11 industrial parcels located in a predominately residential neighborhood. The suit alleges improper waste disposal, illegal dumping and zoning violations affecting the neighborhood. At trial, our clients hope to obtain a court-ordered injunction requiring abatement of these conditions.

In 2025, 23% of Stinson's pro bono work involved the protection of civil liberties and advancement of criminal justice with hours dedicated to high-impact litigation, innocence work, expungement and more.

CIVIL LIBERTIES

Ensuring Access to Counsel

The ACLU of Florida and Stinson, led by Tampa Partners Murray Silverstein and Nathan Foell and Washington, DC attorney Harvey Reiter, filed a lawsuit challenging conditions at a Florida detention center that was limiting access to legal counsel for detainees. The case concluded with a positive settlement for our client and future detainees, with the detention center committing to improving access to attorney-client communications, including reliable options for private legal calls, clear procedures for receiving and sending legal mail and accommodations for group legal visits. The settlement also established an accountability process, allowing detainees to file grievances with the detention center or directly with Immigration and Customs Enforcement and Removal Operations if they believe the settlement's terms have not been followed. In total, 18 timekeepers from six Stinson offices logged more than 600 hours to the matter.

Combating Censorship

The ACLU of Missouri and Stinson, led by Kansas City Partner and Pro Bono Committee Co-Chair Brad Yeretsky, filed a lawsuit on behalf of the Missouri Association of School Librarians and the Missouri Library Association. The suit challenged a Missouri law that led library professionals and school districts across the state to remove hundreds of books from shelves, change policies and limit electronic access. In November, a judge held that the law was unconstitutionally vague and an overbroad restriction on freedom of speech and the due process rights of library professionals. In total, 26 timekeepers from seven Stinson offices logged nearly 900 hours to the matter.

Preserving Gender Markers on Drivers' Licenses

The ACLU of Kansas, ACLU National and Stinson continued work in a suit where they intervened between the Kansas Attorney General and Kansas Department of Revenue (KDOR) on behalf of five transgender Kansans regarding changes to gender markers on driver's licenses following the passage of Kansas Senate Bill 180. After an unfavorable ruling against our clients in the trial court, the Kansas Court of Appeals ruled in favor of our clients, finding the Attorney General was unlikely to prevail on his position that SB 180 requires all new and renewed driver's licenses to list a driver's sex assigned at birth. Because the Attorney General sought review by the Kansas Supreme Court, the Court of Appeals' ruling did not take effect until the Kansas Supreme Court denied his petition for review a few months later, allowing the Kansas Department of Revenue to resume its prior practice of permitting changes to gender markers on driver's licenses. In total, 17 timekeepers from four Stinson offices, led by Kansas City Partner Doug Dalglish, logged more than 1,000 hours to the matter.

Federal Court Appointments

Stinson attorneys continued to accept federal court appointments and civil panel matters in jurisdictions across the country. In 2025, 14 timekeepers from six offices logged more than 1,000 hours on multiple appointed and panel matters, with Denver attorneys and paralegals dedicating nearly 400 hours to two appointments from the Colorado Civil Pro Bono Panel. Stinson's representation helped a deaf inmate obtain access to appropriate accommodations, aided in complex post-conviction proceedings and provided advocacy to incarcerated individuals seeking necessary services and support.

Filing for Habeas for Immigrant Detainee

In 2025, Stinson timekeepers filed a habeas petition seeking the release of an asylum seeker who was detained at her immigration court hearing. The team, led by Minneapolis Partner Byron Starns, secured a client's release through a habeas petition filed in the U.S. District Court for the District of Minnesota, obtaining the client's release after five months in detention. Following her return to Minnesota, the client was able to reconnect with medical and support services and return to her work in senior services as she awaits a decision on her application for asylum.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE

Midwest Innocence Project

The Midwest Innocence Project (MIP) investigates wrongful convictions and fights to bring innocent people home. Their work includes legal representation, case investigations, policy advocacy, public education and support services for exonerees and freed individuals rebuilding their lives after wrongful incarceration. According to the MIP's 2025 Annual Report, due to limited staffing, 732 individuals seeking representation from the MIP are waiting for their application to be screened. To help clear this backlog, the MIP and Stinson, under the leadership of Kansas City Partner Colin Turner, launched a project through which Stinson legal teams will review applicants' case files and present their findings to MIP staff, making recommendations about which cases would warrant further investigation. Over the course of the year, 65 timekeepers from nine offices participated in training and 13 different case investigations. In addition, Stinson's longstanding work as co-counsel on a litigated MIP matter continued, with 20 Stinson Kansas City attorneys, including John Aisenbrey, Vicki Smith, Ashley Crisafulli, summer associates and paralegals across seven offices dedicating 368 hours to the case.

Korey Wise Innocence Project

Stinson attorneys continued their post-conviction relief work with the Korey Wise Innocence Project. In 2025, Denver Partner Perry Glantz, attorney Judith Araujo and 11 other timekeepers across five offices served as co-counsel on two innocence matters, logging nearly 200 hours to those cases.

Survivor Reentry Project

According to the National Survivor Network Survey, 91% of human trafficking survivors have arrests on their records resulting from coercion by their traffickers. A conviction or arrest history can prevent survivors from obtaining employment, receiving housing assistance or pursuing an education, making them more vulnerable to future victimization. In 2025, Stinson continued its coverage of the national hotline for two months of the year and expanded representation of human trafficking survivors seeking criminal record relief, with 19 timekeepers from nine Stinson offices donating more than 200 hours to the cause.

Expungement and Driver's License Restoration Work

In 2025, Stinson dedicated nearly 800 hours to expungement and driver's license restoration clinics and full-representation matters, with the Wichita office taking a lead role. Wichita attorneys and paralegals participated in clinics that served approximately 200 clients seeking expungements for low-level offenses and about 90 clients seeking driver's license restoration. Later in the year, the team accepted multiple full-representation expungement matters through Kansas Legal Services' annual expungement drive.

Filing for Habeas for Immigrant Detainee

In 2025, Stinson timekeepers filed a habeas petition seeking the release of an asylum seeker who was detained at her immigration court hearing. The team, led by Minneapolis Partner Byron Starns, secured a client's release through a habeas petition filed in the U.S. District Court for the District of Minnesota, obtaining the client's release after five months in detention. Following her return to Minnesota, the client was able to reconnect with medical and support services and return to her work in senior services as she awaits a decision on her application for asylum.

International Human Rights & Immigration

In 2025, 15% of Stinson's pro bono work was devoted to international human rights research and advocacy, along with the direct representation of immigrants. Through partnerships with organizations like The Advocates for Human Rights and Asylum Clinic Kansas City, Stinson was able to provide high-quality legal services to asylum seekers, human trafficking survivors, unaccompanied minors and those who served the U.S. government abroad.

INTERNATIONAL HUMAN RIGHTS

Stinson dedicated nearly 200 hours in 2025 to matters referred by The Advocates for Human Rights involving global human rights monitoring and advocacy. Minneapolis Of Counsel John Bessler, a noted scholar on international human rights and the death penalty, helped lead a July 2025 training hosted by Stinson and The Advocates for Human Rights addressing the current state of the death penalty worldwide and emerging comparative law developments.

IMMIGRATION

The Advocates for Human Rights - In 2025, 57 timekeepers across 10 Stinson offices dedicated 1,756 hours to the representation of immigration clients referred by the organization.

Minnesota

Immigrant Law Center of Minnesota (ILCM) - Stinson continued its partnership with ILCM, representing four crime victims in their applications for U Visas. The firm donated 150 hours to seven matters referred by ILCM, including representation of two clients seeking adjustment of status to lawful permanent residence.

Volunteer Lawyers Network (VLN) / 2025 Pro Bono Distinguished Service Award - Stinson continued its partnership with VLN to help unaccompanied, immigrant minors who have been abused, abandoned or neglected establish guardianships in the United States, a predicate requirement for applying for Special Immigrant Juvenile Status. Minneapolis Partner Byron Starns worked with all seven local summer associates to secure 17 guardianships for at-risk juveniles in Minnesota. His deep commitment to this work, together with his many other pro bono contributions over the years, earned him the firm's Pro Bono Distinguished Service Award.

Washington, DC

In Washington, DC, Stinson continued its longstanding partnership with the Tahirih Justice Center on gender-based immigration matters. In a matter originally referred to the firm in 2017, Stinson helped a Kenyan woman seek asylum based on significant abuse suffered in her country of origin. Following a successful asylum hearing, the client's children were able to join her in Virginia after years of separation. Over the life of the matter, nine timekeepers donated more than 1,000 hours to help the client establish a new life in the United States. Stinson attorneys are now assisting the client with adjustment of status to lawful permanent residence.

Kansas City

Asylum Clinic Kansas City (ACKC) and the Pro Bono Service Award - In 2025, 11 Stinson timekeepers donated nearly 600 hours to 12 clients referred to the firm by ACKC. Kansas City Corporate Finance paralegal MacKenzie Stewart received the firm's 2025 Pro Bono Service Award for donating 164 pro bono hours supporting the firm's lawyers in their representation of ACKC clients.

Awards & Recognitions

LAW FIRM PRO BONO AWARD

The Advocates for Human Rights honored Stinson with its Law Firm Pro Bono Award in recognition of the firm's response to the legal needs of Guinean and Liberian asylum seekers and its broader work at the Deinard Legal Clinic.

MELTON M. LEWIS EQUAL JUSTICE AWARD

Stinson and the National Center for Law and Economic Justice were recognized with the Melton M. Lewis Equal Justice Award for co-counseling with Legal Services of Eastern Missouri in successful litigation involving the illegal denial of Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefits to low-income Missourians. The matter, led by Stinson St. Louis Partners Andrew Scavotto and Nicci Warr, continues to drive systemic reform across the state.

BEACON OF JUSTICE AWARD

Stinson received the National Legal Aid and Defender Association's Beacon of Justice Award for pro bono work focused on sustaining equal justice for families and communities. The award recognized Stinson's contributions in four primary areas: strengthening civil rights protections, legal representation for families in crisis, community justice initiatives and empowering vulnerable populations.

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

Stinson received the Children's Law Center (CLC) of Minnesota Distinguished Service Award at the organization's 30th Celebration of Champions, recognizing more than 550 pro bono hours donated to clients referred by CLC over the last five years, under the leadership of Minneapolis Partners Amy Conway and Melinda Dugas.

WELCH AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN VOLUNTEER SERVICES

Legal Aid of Western Missouri honored Kansas City Partner Sean Colligan with the Welch Award for Excellence in Volunteer Services for his longstanding guardianship work and broader commitment to pro bono representation.

JUSTICE MATTERS ALLIANCE
